Ngā mihi nui ki a koutou katoa. Greetings to you all.

Te Wiki o te Reo Māori happens from 11-17 Hepetema (September) 2023. The theme of Kia Kaha Te Reo Māori – making the language stronger - will continue this year, picking up from where it left off in 2022. The campaign is an essential piece of the puzzle to achieving the goal of 1 million speakers of te reo Māori in 2040.

About Te Wiki o te Reo Māori

Māori Language Week has been celebrated in Aotearoa since 1975.

This special week is an opportunity for the concentrated celebration and

promotion of te reo Māori, helping to secure its future as a living, dynamic, and rich language.

In the mid-20th century, there were concerns that the Māori language was dying out. The future of te reo Māori was the subject of a Waitangi Tribunal claim in 1985. The tribunal's recommendations led to far-reaching legislative and policy changes. Māori became an official language of New Zealand in 1987. Te Taura Whiri i te Reo Māori was established in the same year to promote te reo.

Te Wiki o te Reo Māori is part of a broad Māori language revival programme and raises public awareness for Māori language learning and public usage. Mahuru Māori was an initiative begun in 2017 to promote the use of te reo Māori throughout the month of September. Mahuru Māori in 2023 is on Friday 15 September, in line with maramataka Māori. *From TKI, Ministry of Education*

Ideas that you can do as a whānau to promote te reo at home are:

- Learn a Māori kupu (word) each day
 - The NZ History website provides a list of 100 Māori words every New Zealander should know and 365 useful words and phrases in te reo Māori.
- Support your child to create and share their pepeha
 - Pepeha is a way of introducing yourself in Māori. A pepeha describes your identity and heritage by telling a story of the places and people you are connected to.
- Sing waiata
 - Learn some traditional waiata (songs) with your children. Have a family concert.
- Explore Māori placenames
 - Work with your tamariki (children) to investigate your local Māori place names. Learn the meaning behind the names and how to pronounce them correctly.
- Read Māori myths and legends
- Create some artwork together using traditional Māori designs or techniques (e.g. weaving)







We are coming to the end of another very busy term and I'm looking forward to watching our Dancesplash group perform on Thursday at the Michael Fowler Centre. A big thank you to Lisa Preston and Kylie Chapman for all their efforts with this and to Amy Hema and Paige Foster for assisting.
