Cool Schools Peer Mediation Programme



In the holidays, all staff worked with Christina Barruel from the Peace Foundation to learn about the Cool Schools Peer Mediation Programme which we are introducing across the school.

The Cool Schools Peer Mediation Programme promotes peaceful conflict resolution in primary schools throughout Aotearoa. It is a whole-school approach to conflict resolution which can shift the culture of a school in supporting the building of positive, caring, safe relationships with others especially in times of conflict.

The programme engages children in understanding constructive ways of managing inevitable conflicts that arise in life.

Children learn to demonstrate empathy for others, become effective communicators, co-operative members of a team, effective leaders, and caring, concerned members of their communities. Taken from Cool Schools Manual for Primary Teachers, The Peace Foundation

Staff were asked the question "Why Cool Schools?" and gave the following responses:

- There should be less conflict which will lead to better learning & growth
- It supports student agency
- The mediation process is taught and modelled to staff and students
- It fosters tuakana / teina relationships
- It teaches collaborative problem solving skills
- It is restorative based
- Children understand how each other feels it fosters empathy
- It empowers students with life skills
- If more students are solving conflicts it supports staff and takes less of their time
- Minor conflicts do not escalate
- Students take ownership of their behaviour and their relationships
- Students get tools to help solve conflict in a positive manner
- Cool Schools is an evidence based programme

We are really excited to work through this programme - I will include more information in upcoming newsletters about the Cool Schools Peer Mediation Programme and update everyone on the progress we are making as a school.
